

Everyday Preventive Actions Can **Help Fight Germs, Like Flu**



CDC recommends three actions to fight flu.

- 1. The first and most important step is to get a flu vaccination each year.
- 2. If you get sick with flu, take prescription antiviral drugs if your doctor prescribes them. Early treatment is especially important for the elderly, the very young, people with certain chronic health conditions, and pregnant women.
- Take everyday preventive actions that may slow the spread of germs that cause respiratory (nose, throat, and lungs) illnesses, like flu. This flyer contains information about everyday preventive actions.

How does flu spread?

Flu viruses are thought to spread mainly from person to person through droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze, or talk. Less often, a person might get flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching his or her own mouth, nose, or possibly eyes. Many other viruses spread these ways too. People infected with flu may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5-7 days after becoming sick. That means you may be able to spread flu to someone else before you know you are sick as well as while you are sick. Young children, those who are severely ill, and those who have severely weakened immune systems may be able to infect others for longer than 5-7 days.

What are everyday preventive actions?

- Try to avoid close contact with sick people.
- If you or your child gets sick with flu-like illness, CDC recommends that you (or your child) stay home for at least 24 hours after the fever is gone except to get medical care or for other necessities. The fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.
- While sick, limit contact with others as much as possible to keep from infecting them.
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. After using a tissue, throw it in the trash and wash your hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- · Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that may be contaminated with germs that can cause respiratory illnesses like flu.
- If an outbreak of flu or another illness occurs, follow public health advice. This may include information about how to increase distance between people and other measures.

What additional steps can I take at work to help stop the spread of germs that can cause respiratory illness, like flu?

- Find out about your employer's plans if an outbreak of flu or another illness occurs and whether flu vaccinations are offered on-site.
- Routinely clean frequently touched objects and surfaces like doorknobs, keyboards, and phones, to help remove germs.
- Make sure your workplace has an adequate supply of tissues, soap, paper towels, alcohol-based hand rubs, and disposable wipes.
- Train others on how to do your job so they can cover for you in case you or a family member gets sick and you have to stay home.
- If you begin to feel sick while at work, go home as soon as possible.




What additional preventive actions can I take to protect my child from germs that can cause respiratory illness, like flu?

- Find out about plans your child's school, child care program, or college has if an outbreak of flu or another illness occurs and whether flu vaccinations are offered on-site.
- Make sure your child's school, child care program, or college routinely cleans frequently touched objects and surfaces, and that they have a good supply of tissues, soap, paper towels, alcohol-based hand rubs, and disposable wipes on-site.
- Ask how sick students and staff are separated from others and who will care for them until they can go home.

Everyday preventive actions can help slow the spread of germs that can cause many different illnesses and may offer some protection against flu. CTOBER.


Going to a College Fair this fall? You must first register for a barcode!

Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Give them advance notice, a specific deadline, and a copy of your Activities Resume.


Ask at least two people to proofread your application.

Lewiston Consolidated Schools School Board Meeting Minutes September 11, 2019

A regular meeting of the Lewiston School Board District 69 was held on Wednesday, September 11th, at 7:00 p.m. This meeting was open to the public and preceded in notice as required by law. The meeting was called to order by President Aaron Rule and he verbally acknowledged the Open Meetings Law poster on the wall and that the meeting was recorded. Roll call found the following members to be present: Janssen, Rinne, Rule, Schuster, and Searcey. Excused Absence: Husa. Also present: Rick Kentfield, Juli Smith, Linda Thomas, and two visitors.

The agenda was reviewed. Moved by Searcey and seconded by Rinne "to approve the agenda as presented." Those voting in favor of said motion: Janssen, Rinne, Rule, Schuster, Searcey. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Visitors were welcomed. There were no visitor comments.

Moved by Rinne and seconded by Searcey "to approve the minutes of the August 14, 2019, school board meeting and August 28, 2019 school board workshop minutes as presented." Those voting in favor of said motion: Rinne, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Janssen. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

The treasurer's report was presented by Dennis Schuster, and Rick Kentfield presented the monthly claims, payroll, and transfers. Moved by Rinne and seconded by Searcey "to approve the September treasurer's report, September payroll and claims as presented in the amount of \$320,074.39." Those voting in favor of said motion: Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Janssen, Rinne. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Moved by Janssen and seconded by Rinne "to approve 2019-2020 budget as presented and published in the Pawnee Republican." Those voting in favor of said motion: Schuster, Searcey, Janssen, Rinne, Rule. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Rick Kentfield, Superintendent, read the 2019/2020 Tax Request Resolution for Pawnee County School District 67-0069. Moved by Rinne and seconded by Schuster "to adopt the 2019-2020 property tax resolution for Pawnee County School District 67-0069 as presented." Those voting in favor of said motion: Searcey, Janssen, Rinne, Rule, Schuster. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Discussion was held regarding the Piper Jaffray tax anticipation note.

Moved by Schuster and seconded by Rinne "to approve a revolving line of credit from Pinnacle Bank, Beatrice, Nebraska in the amount of \$300,000 for Pawnee County School District #69 for the 2019-2020 school year starting September 2, 2019 and ending August 31, 2020 to be used for General Fund expenditures." Those voting in favor of said motion: Janssen, Rinne, Rule, Schuster, Searcey. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Moved by Janssen and seconded by Rinne "to approve a six-man football classification for the next two years, 2020-2021, at Lewiston Consolidated Schools." Those voting in favor of said motion: Janssen, Rinne, Rule, Schuster, Searcey. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Mr. Kentfield discussed timelines on the ADA doors, parking stalls, and kitchen project.

Discussion was held on facility projects.

Juli Smith, Principal, shared information on student testing and achievement, reading program, and motivating students to excel in class work.

Mr. Kentfield, Superintendent, presented information on staffing cost comparison, free and reduced meal count percentage report, student board member update, Marcia Herring workshop December 11th at 6:00 p.m., and 2019 State Education Conference November 20-22nd.

Board Committee Reports – none at this time.

Moved by Searcey and seconded by Rinne "to adjourn at 8:40 p.m." Those voting in favor of said motion: Rinne, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Janssen. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Next regular school board meeting will be Wednesday, October 16th, at 7:00 p.m.
