The reason for talking about the school board election at such an early date is due to the important filing deadlines that are approaching fast.

February 15, 2024, is the deadline for incumbents, and March 1, 2024, is the last day for non-incumbent candidates to file.



Seniors...make sure you complete the FAFSA process

Getting financial aid for college involves more than completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Complete each step of the process so that you don't miss out on money for college.

- **If you haven't already, complete your 2024-25 FAFSA** at studentaid.gov using 2022 income tax data. Before you start, you and a parent must each create a Student Aid account. If you need help with your FAFSA, contact EducationQuest to set up a **free** virtual appointment.
- **Expect a Student Aid Report (SAR) via an email link.** The SAR acknowledges that your FAFSA was received and lets you know if you need to take further action before the form can be processed.
- **You might receive a verification notice** from the college(s) you listed on your FAFSA requesting documents to verify your FAFSA information. The college will not process your financial aid until you provide required documents.
- **Watch for financial aid award notifications.** Once you're accepted for admission to the colleges you listed on your FAFSA, they will notify you of the types and amounts of financial aid they're offering.

Tips For Finding Scholarships

- **Organize scholarships in deadline order** and set aside time each week to work on them.
- **Focus on college-based and local scholarships.** You're more likely to earn them over large national awards.
- **On the application, list your activities, awards, honors classes and volunteer or paid jobs.** Track them using the *Activities Resume* from EducationQuest (efq.org/ActResume).
- **Earn the best possible ACT scores** by taking the exam in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.
- **If an application requires a letter of recommendation,** give the person writing the letter plenty of notice, a specific deadline, and a copy of your *Activities Resume*.
- **After writing an essay,** ask an English teacher to review it.
- **NEVER pay for scholarship services!**
- **Follow all directions,** and make sure the application is complete and submitted by the deadline or it will be disqualified. This video has more tips: <https://youtu.be/4MHQV3HeL0E>

What you need to know about scholarships

Many scholarships are based on academics, but others are based on community service, school involvement, or talent. Some are based on financial need as determined by the results of your FAFSA.

Here's where to look for scholarships:

- **ScholarshipQuest at EducationQuest.org** houses over 2,000 Nebraska-based scholarships. After you create a profile, you'll be matched with scholarships that fit your criteria. You'll also find links to national sites that EducationQuest recommends.
- **Your school counselor's office.** Watch for emails from Mrs. Houston about scholarships.
- **The college you plan to attend.** Contact the school for a list of scholarships they provide and the application procedures.
- **Other resources** could include your coach, clubs and organizations, and your parents' employers and civic organizations.

From the Corner Room

January 2024

This year is going by fast! It is hard to believe that it is February already! I think the snow days we had in January might have had something to do with that! The classes are settling down into their routines. There is a lot of learning ahead of us!

The PBL class is growing. Five students joined the class at semester. They are a very creative group of students. Recycling cardboard seems to be the pattern for projects. Their projects are very innovative and well made. Some projects they have completed or are working on include cardboard helmets, warrior shields, characters from movies, crowns, and many more.

Seventh grade is finishing up a food unit (a favorite of theirs). They are preparing simple foods, but also nutrition, food and kitchen safety. The food preparation part was the best. It was enjoyable to see them working together to make delicious food (and then eating what they made)!

The Quick and Easy class learned how to prepare soups for a crowd by doing most of the food preparation for the LCS Soup Supper in January. This was a huge project for the three students in the class. In preparation for this huge task, they also prepared a variety of soups for themselves.

Having a Child Development class and a Textile class this semester is wonderful. The students in these classes are so interested in what they are learning. It is exciting to hear how they are using the information they learned outside of class! Child Development students are beginning a prenatal unit and planning how to care for an infant. Textile students are brushing up on their skills and attempting some unusual projects.

Research¹ has shown that the skills your child needs to be successful in the future are social and emotional skills!

The more socially skilled children are, the more likely they are to succeed in school. Because this is so important for your child, we are using the Pyramid Model in our program.



What is the Pyramid Model?

The Pyramid Model is a framework for supporting the social and emotional development of our children. The goal of the Pyramid Model is to create an environment where every child feels good about coming to school. This is accomplished by designing classrooms that promote engagement in learning and by building positive relationships among children, families, and staff. In our use of the Pyramid Model, our classroom staff will work together to ensure that all children understand behavior expectations, receive instruction in social skills, and those who are struggling receive individual support.

The Pyramid Model illustrates that the foundation for helping children develop social and emotional skills is nurturing and responsive relationships and high quality environments. The middle of the Pyramid, teaching of social and emotional skills, is provided to all children with some children receiving additional teaching and support. The top of the Pyramid shows that a few children will need the foundation, the middle AND individualized intervention to address challenging behavior.

To use the Pyramid Model, our program established a leadership team that will provide ongoing support to our staff and families. Our leadership team looks forward to sharing some of the important work we are doing, including teaching program-wide expectations, partnering with families, training staff in teaching strategies, providing classroom coaching to help teachers implement, and using data for decision-making. Stay tuned for ongoing updates about the Pyramid Model in our program!

What is gained by using the Pyramid Model?

FAMILIES

- Receive information on how to help promote children's social and emotional skills
- Team with teachers to help children grow and learn
- Receive support for preventing and addressing behavior problems

TEACHERS

- Are effective in helping children learn social and emotional skills
- Strengthen classroom management skills
- Have information and resources to support families

CHILDREN

- Increase their social and emotional skills
- Improve in their readiness for kindergarten

THEME

Traditions are customs, beliefs, or occasions that people share. They bring us together for some intended purpose and foster a sense of community. In the best cases, traditions—including democratic traditions—strengthen the bonds between us. They represent common ground between different groups.

What traditions are or have been present in Nebraska that set us apart from other places? We encourage you to think of "tradition" in its broadest definition: it can include places (like the Northwest Nebraska Barn Quilt Trail or the Malcolm X Memorial Foundation), events (such as the annual Christmas pageant in Minden, the Nebraska State Fair, or the annual Northern Ponca Powwow), customs (football tailgating), values (the nonpartisan unicameral state government), and many other unifying forces.

School Board Meeting Minutes
January 11, 2024

A regular meeting of the District 69 Board of Education, Pawnee County, was held on Thursday, January 11 th , at 7:30 p.m., the meeting being open to the public and proceeded in notice as required by law. Notice of this meeting was given to the President and all members of the Board and a copy of the acknowledgement of notice and the agenda is noted in the minutes.

Availability of the agenda was communicated to the public in advanced notice and to the President of the Board and all Board members.

The meeting was called to order, the Open Meetings Law poster recognized, and verbal notice that the meeting was recorded was given by the President and on a roll call vote, the following members were present: Howell, Rule, Searcey, Wehrbein. Excused Absence: Bredemeier and Mencl. Also present: Rick Kentfield, Juli Smith and one visitor.

The agenda was reviewed. Moved by Howell and seconded by Searcey “to approve the agenda as presented.” Those voting in favor of said motion: Howell, Rule, Searcey, and Wehrbein. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 4-0.

Visitor comments. There were no visitor comments.

Nominations for Board President: Rule was nominated by Searcey, seconded by Howell, Wehrbein moved to nominations cease. Votes were cast and Rule was elected President by a vote of 4-0.

Nominations for Vice President: Searcey was nominated by Howell, seconded by Wehrbein, Howell moved nominations cease. Votes were cast and Searcey was elected Vice President by a vote of 4-0.

Nominations for Treasurer: Bredemeier was nominated by Howell, seconded by Searcey, Wehrbein moved nominations cease. Votes were cast and Bredemeier was elected Treasurer by a vote of 4-0.

Nominations for Secretary: Kentfield was appointed by Rule, seconded by Searcey, Wehrbein moved nominations cease. Votes were cast and Kentfield was appointed Secretary by a vote of 4-0.

Moved by Howell and seconded by Wehrbein “to approve Consent Agenda items which included 4.1, December 11 th board meeting minutes, 4.2 January Treasurers Report with ending balance of

\$701,269.24, 4.3 January payroll in the amount of \$266,267.87, and January claims in the amount of \$57,502.81”. Those voting in favor of said motion: Rule, Searcey, Wehrbein, and Howell. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 4-0.

Conflict of Interest rules and regulations were reviewed and discussed. It was determined that the current documentation on file in the superintendent’s office was correct and did not need modified.

Board committees for 2024 were reviewed and discussed. There were no committee changes made.

Rick Kentfield, Superintendent, updated the board on facility projects. Change order #2 submitted by BluCor regarding East Elevation Exterior Signage was discussed. Kentfield will contact BluCor with proposed signage changes for the new press box.

Moved by Searcey and seconded by Howell to “approve board policy #4041 Staff Dress and Appearance as presented”. Those voting in favor of said motion: Searcey, Wehrbein, Howell, and Rule. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 4-0.

Moved by Wehrbein and seconded by Howell to “approve Rick Kentfield’s annual superintendent’s evaluation as presented”. Those voting in favor of said motion: Wehrbein, Howell, Rule, and Searcey. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 4-0.

Juli Smith, Principal, provided updates on activities and programs.

Rick Kentfield, Superintendent, reported on 2024 board election process, negotiations, and upcoming board agenda items. Board Committee Report – The board’s negotiation committee scheduled a meeting on January 18 th at 6:30.

Moved by Howell and seconded by Wehrbein “to adjourn at 8:18 p.m.”. Those voting in favor of said motion: Wehrbein, Howell, Rule, and Searcey. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 4-0.

Next regular school board meeting will be Thursday, February 15th, at 7:30 p.m.

PRESCHOOL OPEN HOUSE



We are excited to be enrolling new three and four year-olds to our program. A three-year old is defined as a child who will be three years of age on or before July 31, 2024. (four year-olds must be four by July 31, 2024) Being potty trained is a requirement to enter the preschool program. Our preschool offers a positive, hands-on, play based atmosphere where all children can learn and grow at their own pace.


