School Closings and Delays Information

It's that time of year again to prepare for bad weather. In the event adverse weather conditions affect the school's regular schedule you will receive a text from the district's Electronic Alert System. This system will send a text to each of the phone numbers you have registered with the school for contact purposes. You can also listen to KWBE, KUTT/ KGMT radio or watch channels 8 and 10-11 on your television.

It is important to remember two items when late starts occur. First, buses will run according to the announced late start. If a "2 hour late start" is announced, plan on the buses running two hours later than normal. Secondly, always error on the side of caution when determining rather to allow your child to drive to and from school when road conditions are questionable. Safety is priority one.

Senior Information

EducationQuest at Lewiston on December 8

On December 8 the EducationQuest Foundation presented a financial aid presentation for seniors. The presentation focused on college admission, types of financial aid, scholarships, and FAFSA (Fee Application for Federal Student Aid) completion. Seniors were advised to apply for at least 75 scholarships, as previous experiences show that they usually will only receive 10% of the scholarships applied for.

EducationQuest Foundation is a nonprofit organization with a mission to improve access to higher education in Nebraska. They fulfill their mission through *free* college planning services, outreach services, need-based scholarship programs, and college access grants. They are available to talk to any parent/guardian about any questions they may have through the financial aid process.

Other Scholarship Information

Seniors have received a sheet that has a list of scholarships that I have received during the course of this school year. They have been sent home a group of scholarships to view over the holiday break so that they can start writing essays and get prepared to apply for scholarships in January. The Lewiston FFA Chapter hosted their fall Leadership Night on November 19th at the L.H.S. gymnasium. President Dalton Anderson conducted the meeting for members, parents, and guests.

The highlight of the night was the Degree Ceremonies. Earning their Discovery Degrees were eighth graders; Sydney Rath, Chaz Wilgers, Levi Meybrunn, Dana Christen, Courtnie Zyla, Caleb Bredemeier, and Danny McMurray. The Discovery Degree is the first level of FFA membership. Students must be enrolled in an Agriculture Education class and participate in Chapter activities on the local level.

Seven members were accepted into the FFA as Greenhands. The Greenhand Degree was bestowed upon Ryan Hunt, Jacob Meybrunn, Kristin Meybrunn, Richard Keyes, Colten Baker, Treyton Hippen, and Logan Anderson. The degree requirements include active participation in Chapter events, knowledge of parliamentary procedure, basic FFA knowledge, and plans for a Supervised Agriculture Experience (S.A.E.) Program. The group received a bronze pin.

Four Lewiston members were awarded the Chapter Degree by the officers. These recipients demonstrated parliamentary procedure abilities, had an established S.A.E., performed at least ten community service hours, and presented a group discussion presentation. Receiving their silver pin were Karen Keyes, Megan Wehrbein, Skyler Salts, and Miah Fulton.

The speaker for the evening program was Mrs. Brooke Engelman of Classic Dairy of Jansen, NE. Mrs. Engelman is a 2015-16 Nebraska LEAD member. She spoke on her travels to India and the Middle East and the agriculture she observed.

Lewiston Ag Education Students Tour Local Businesses

Fifteen Lewiston FFA members toured four local businesses on Wednesday, December 16th. Parents and guests accompanied the Ag Education students. Mr. Dave Barnard, Chapter Advisor accompanied the group.

The tour was part of the Lewiston Schools career pathways curriculum. The students visited with company leaders and discussed entry level skills. At Classic Dairy and Farmers Cooperative-Jansen Branch, the students enhanced their "Nutrients For Life" natural resources curriculum.

The first stop was NEAPCO manufacturing in Beatrice. NEAPCO designs, manufactures, and distributes driveline products. The group enjoyed the production floor.

The Farmers Cooperative Branch at Jansen was the next ag-business visited. The new facility handles dry fertilizer for ag producers in southern Nebraska and northern Kansas. The plant is very automated and the original structure held 14,000 tons of fertilizer. A railroad car can be unloaded in 20 minutes.

The Lewiston students then toured Classic Dairy near Harbine, NE. Their hosts were Dean & Ann Engelman and Adam & Brooke Engelman. They viewed the dairy's new wind turbine and manure handling system. The manure is injected in the cropland or dehydrated and spread out. The water used at the dairy is recycled four times. Over one thousand cows are in production.

The tours concluded at Ratigan-Schottler Manufacturing in Beatrice. The facility produces quality furniture for churches and courtrooms across the nation. Most of the product is made from red oak.

D.A.R.E. Ceremony Held December 3

At 1:00 p.m., on Thursday, December 3rd, fifth and sixth grade students were recognized for their participation in the D.A.R.E program at Lewiston. Through the program they learned the positive effects of staying drug free. All students wrote an essay stating why D.A.R.E. helped them and what they learned. Four students were chosen to read their D.A.R.E. essays at the ceremony. The essays selected were from fifth graders, Carleigh Weyers and Persefenie Woutzke, and sixth graders, Johnathan Burgett and Gianna Martin. Students wrote powerful messages. Persefenie wrote, "I want to have a house of my own. I want to have a family of my own. That's something I can't do with drugs."

During the weeks of the D.A.R.E. program, three junior girls were selected as role models for the younger students. Ana Barker, Shelby Piening, and Cari Howell spent an hour talking to the students about why they choose to be drug free and how to be a leader and not to give in to peer pressure. Carleigh wrote, "I want to be just like those girls because they don't have a single drug or even a drink of alcohol in their lives. They are going to be very successful in life, and that's how I would like to be."
