





A survey was sent to programs in 9 states engaged in statewide implementation using the Pyramid Model state implementation and scale-up approach (State Leadership Team, Cadre of Program Implementation Coaches, Demonstration sites, and data-based decision making). (https://challengingbehavior.cbcs.usf.edu/Implementation/State) Ninety one (91) staff responded including teachers, assistant teachers, behavior specialists, center coordinator/administrator/program leaders, coaches, ECMHCs, early interventionists, family advocates, related service providers, and support staff.





Seniors! A reminder of what to do this fall...

There's A LOT going on right now with the financial aid and college admission processes, but don't get overwhelmed! Here's a recap of tasks you should complete this fall to stay on track to college.

- First, create a Federal Student Aid account (FSA ID) for you and one for a parent at studentaid.gov. You'll need the user names and passwords to access and sign the FAFSA.
- *Review the FAFSA Checklist at EducationQuest.org for items to gather before you start the form.*
- Complete the FAFSA at studentaid.gov.
- For free help with the FAFSA, see FAFSA Tools at EducationQuest.org or call EducationQuest to make a virtual appointment. Lincoln Headquarters Office: 402-475-5222 or 800-303-3745.

Apply to your top college choices!

Check out the EducationQuest Virtual College Fair. The next virtual college fair is November 10th. Register and visit virtual booths for a chance to win a \$500 scholarship.

Retake the ACT. Some colleges will use your best scores for college admission and scholarships and your best score will be on your official school transcript.



Lewiston Consolidated Schools School Board Meeting Minutes October 18, 2021

A regular meeting of the District 69 Board of Education, Pawnee County, was held on Monday, October 18th, at 7:00 p.m., the meeting being open to the public and proceeded in notice as required by law. Notice of this meeting was given to the President and all members of the Board and a copy of the acknowledgement of notice and the agenda is noted in the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated to the public in advanced notice and to the President of the Board and all Board members.

The meeting was called to order, the Open Meetings Law poster recognized, and verbal notice that the meeting was recorded was given by the President and on a roll call vote, the following members were present: Bredemeier, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, and Wehrbein. Excused Absence: none. Also present: Rick Kentfield, Juli Smith, Terry Howell, Linda Thomas, Brady Bledsaw and visitors.

The agenda was reviewed. Moved by Searcey and seconded by Bredemeier "to approve the agenda as presented." Those voting in favor of said motion: Bredemeier, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, and Wehrbein. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Visitors were welcomed. No visitor comments at this time.

Review and approval of minutes were tabled for additional information.

The treasurer's report was presented by Dennis Schuster, and Rick Kentfield presented the monthly claims, payroll, and transfers. Discussion was held. Moved by Searcey and seconded by Wehrbein "to approve the October treasurer's report, October payroll and claims as presented in the amount of \$338,806.59." Those voting in favor of said motion: Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, and Bredemeier. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Moved by Wehrbein and seconded by Schuster "to approve the minutes of the September 15, 2021, Budget Hearing and Tax Levy Hearing, and September 15, 2021, regular school board meeting." Those voting in favor of said motion: Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, Bredemeier, and Rule. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Moved by Wehrbein and seconded by Schuster "to appoint Terry Howell to fill the board member vacancy." Those voting in favor of said motion: Searcey, Wehrbein, Bredemeier, Rule, Schuster. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Rick Kentfield, Secretary, administered the Oath of Office to Terry Howell as the new member of the school board.

Mr. Kentfield updated the board on extra duty assignments.

Mr. Kentfield, Superintendent, reported on the progress of the new track and the elementary boy's restroom remodel, new Vo-Ag building project, and air quality inspection.

Juli Smith, Principal, shared information on homecoming week, JH sports, Red Ribbon week, field trips, FFA student honors at land judging, and MAP testing scores.

Rick Kentfield, Superintendent, welcomed Brady Bledsaw as the new student member of the school board. Mr. Kentfield also gave an update on COVID and Lewiston's updated Safe Return to Learn Plan, enrollment, early graduation requirements, State Education Conference, and scheduling a Veteran's Day program.

Board Committee report – Aaron Rule, football co-op committee member updated the board on the outcome of sharing high school football with Pawnee City School for the 2022-2024 NSAA football cycle. Pawnee City and Lewiston will not be sharing a high school football program during the next two-year cycle. The football committee and board of education members expressed their appreciation for the time and energy that Pawnee City's board of education, football committee, and superintendent spent on the process.

Moved by Searcey and seconded by Howell "to adjourn at 8:32 p.m." Those voting in favor of said motion: Wehrbein, Bredemeier, Howell, Rule, Schuster, and Searcey. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0.

Next regular school board meeting will be Wednesday, November 17th, at 7:00 p.m.

Lewiston Consolidated COVID Information/Recommendations

The district will follow the Southeast Health Department guidance, recommendations, and requirements.

Students will be sent home when becoming ill at school.


Parents will be notified of the presence of any positive cases in their child's classroom that have been "confirmed" by a healthcare professional and encouraged to watch for symptoms at home. We ask that parents please notify the school if your child has been exposed and encourage parents to follow their doctor's direction.

In the event that a student tests positive, immediate efforts should be made to contact any close contacts so that they can be quarantined at home if necessary. Classmates should be closely monitored for any symptoms. Testing of all students in the class is not required. Students developing symptoms are encouraged to test and follow the direction of their doctor.

Parents are encouraged to check student's temperature at home every morning using oral, tympanic, or temporal scanners; students with a temperature of 100.4 greater should stay home and consider coronavirus testing if no other explanation is available.

Parents are encouraged to ask their children or monitor for any cough, congestion, shortness of breath, or gastrointestinal symptoms every morning. Any positives should prompt the parent to keep the student home from school and seek out testing.
