

The purpose of this newsletter is to provide basic information for the Lewiston Consolidated School District that will keep all citizens informed on important school procedures, issues, and facts. Recommendations and Considerations for Positive Descriptive Feedback

Positive descriptive feedback is an evidence-based practice that is meant to be part of the teaching process. It encourages learning. We use the word "feedback" rather than praise or reinforcement because children need to understand what they have done and why we are acknowledging it. Statements like "good boy," "excellent job," and "well done" are examples of praise that provide non-descriptive feedback. The child may respond positively to this kind of praise but it does not help the child understand anything about his behavior or skills. Positive descriptive feedback provides information about the behavior and is a powerful strategy for teaching new skills. These are some recommendations and considerations for using positive descriptive feedback in the classroom.




Describe the behavior by including it in the feedback statement

- ▶ This tells the child exactly what behavior is being acknowledged and is part of the process of teaching that behavior.
- ▶ Identify and provide feedback about skills. For example: "Excellent idea. You solved the problem of everyone wanting the tall blocks by sharing." or "What a good friend. You helped Alicia when she fell."
- ▶ Provide feedback that describes the process the child used. For example: "You really concentrated on making that raceway so it was an exciting game." or "Well done. You followed all the instructions so carefully" or "You counted exactly the correct number of napkins we needed for lunch."

Acknowledge publicly when appropriate

- ▶ Public acknowledgment can reinforce the skill or process for the child you are acknowledging and provide a model for other children.
- ▶ For example, you might acknowledge Elinor for using her "inside" voice when you want the other children to lower their voices.



Individualize the feedback

- ▶ Use the child's name.
- ▶ Be on the look-out for children who practice skills and competencies you are teaching.
- ▶ Learn a phrase you can use as part of your feedback in the home language of the child who is a dual language learner.

Be consistent and be equitable

- ▶ Make sure all of the adults in the classroom know how and when to give positive descriptive feedback.
- ▶ Pay attention to how and how often you and others give positive descriptive feedback. Are all adults in the classroom providing more positive feedback than correction?
- ▶ Ask yourself whether positive feedback is delivered equitably. Are all children acknowledged when they demonstrate a skill, follow directions, meet expectations, or are engaged?

Identify the child, family and cultural norms for feedback and praise

- ▶ Make a point to talk to the family about how and why positive feedback is given in the classroom.
- ▶ Ask the family what they do at home. Different cultures and family groups may have different and very specific ideas about providing positive descriptive feedback. For example:
 - Some cultures/families don't want their child to be acknowledged for their behavior. Children are taught not to stand out or that they should want to do their best without the need for acknowledgement.
 - Some cultures value interdependence and group success rather than individual success.
 - Some children may not like public feedback but may be open to a brief high five or pat on the back.
- ▶ Work with the family to identify ways to give feedback that respects their culture but also provides children with the information they need about their behavior.



College Search Tips:

1. Research colleges:

- Visit college websites and note deadlines for admission, financial aid, and scholarships.
- See College Profiles (EducationQuest.org) for information about colleges nationwide.

2. Visit colleges that interest you:

- Begin your visits during your junior year.
- Set up your visits at least 2 weeks in advance.
- Ask several questions during your visit. EducationQuest has a comprehensive list of questions located on their **College Profiles** page.

3. Narrow your list of colleges:

- Narrow your list to 3-4 colleges.
- Apply to your top college choices before their admission deadlines.

College Visit Tips:

Explore your career interests. Think about your career interests and then research colleges that fit your interests. Visit the Exploring Careers section at EducationQuest.org for free resources.

Schedule your visits at least 2 weeks in advance. Ask for appointments with an admissions representative, financial aid counselor, and a faculty member in your area of interest.

Try to visit while the colleges are in session. You won't get the true flavor during breaks or finals week.

Be prepared with questions to ask. It's important for YOU to ask questions, not just your mom or dad.

If you can't visit a college, check out college websites. You'll find admission requirements, academic and financial aid information, and campus photos. Many colleges now have **virtual tours**, so you may explore the college from home.

School Board Meeting Minutes
November 17, 2021

A regular meeting of the District 69 Board of Education, Pawnee County, was held on Wednesday, November 17th, at 7:00 p.m., the meeting being open to the public and proceeded in notice as required by law. Notice of this meeting was given to the President and all members of the Board and a copy of the acknowledgement of notice and the agenda is noted in the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated to the public in advanced notice and to the President of the Board and all Board members.

The meeting was called to order, the Open Meetings Law poster recognized, and verbal notice that the meeting was recorded was given by the President and on a roll call vote, the following members were present: Bredemeier, Howell, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, and Wehrbein. Excused Absence: none. Also present: Rick Kentfield, Juli Smith, Linda Thomas, Brady Bledsaw and visitors.

The agenda was reviewed. Moved by Howell and seconded by Searcey “to approve the agenda as presented with the exception of moving agenda item 5.6 to 5.1.” Those voting in favor of said motion: Howell, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, and Bredemeier. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0.

Visitors were welcomed. No visitor comments at this time.

Moved by Wehrbein and seconded by Howell “to approve the minutes of the October 18, 2021, regular school board meeting as presented.” Those voting in favor of said motion: Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, Bredemeier, and Howell. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0.

The treasurer’s report was presented by Dennis Schuster, and Rick Kentfield presented the monthly claims, payroll, and transfers. Moved by Schuster and seconded by Bredemeier “to approve the November treasurer’s report, November payroll and claims as presented in the amount of \$304,729.99.” Those voting in favor of said motion: Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, Bredemeier, Howell, and Rule. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0.

Kent Hippen made a verbal offer to the school board for the purchase of a 3-acre parcel of property from the Charlene Hippen estate in the amount of \$160,000. Discussion was held and the school board will give a response to Mr. Hippen at the December school board meeting.

Moved by Searcey and seconded by Wehrbein “to approve Michelle Baker’s Food Service Director’s employment agreement as presented.” Those voting in favor of said motion: Searcey, Wehrbein, Bredemeier, Howell, Rule, and Schuster. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0.

Rick Kentfield, Superintendent, shared information on the school’s 2021-2022 enrollment.

Moved by Schuster and seconded by Howell “to approve the annual ALICAP Safety Audit as presented.” Those voting in favor of said motion: Wehrbein, Bredemeier, Howell, Rule, Schuster, and Searcey. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0.

Discussion was held. Moved by Howell and seconded by Bredemeier “to accept Abel Gonzalez’ application for early graduation per board policy #5066 as presented.” Those voting in favor of said motion: Bredemeier, Howell, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, and Wehrbein. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0.

Mr. Kentfield reported on the progress of the new track and new Vo-Ag building projects.

Discussion was held. Moved by Howell and seconded by Wehrbein “to accept the revised 2021-2022 school calendar with no teacher in-service on November 23, 2021, from 1:00-4:00 p.m. as presented.” Those voting in favor of said motion: Howell, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, and Bredemeier. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0.

Juli Smith, Principal, and Heather Campbell, Art Teacher, gave a presentation on the multi tier system of support (MTSS) currently being implemented with our teachers and students.

Rick Kentfield, Superintendent, gave an update on COVID and our continued communication with Southeast Health Department, board committee information, and Pawnee County voting precinct changes handout.

Board Committee report – No report at this time.

Moved by Schuster and seconded by Howell “to adjourn at 8:34 p.m.” Those voting in favor of said motion: Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, Bredemeier, and Howell. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0.

Next regular school board meeting will be Thursday, December 16th, at 7:00 p.m.

Lewiston Consolidated COVID Information/Recommendations

- The district will follow the Southeast Health Department guidance, recommendations, and requirements.
- Students will be sent home when becoming ill at school.
- Parents will be notified of the presence of any positive cases in their child's classroom that have been "confirmed" by a healthcare professional and encouraged to watch for symptoms at home. We ask that parents please notify the school if your child has been exposed and encourage parents to follow their doctor's direction.
- In the event that a student tests positive, immediate efforts should be made to contact any close contacts so that they can be quarantined at home if necessary. Classmates should be closely monitored for any symptoms. Testing of all students in the class is not required. Students developing symptoms are encouraged to test and follow the direction of their doctor.
- Parents are encouraged to check student's temperature at home every morning using oral, tympanic, or temporal scanners; students with a temperature of 100.4 greater should stay home and consider coronavirus testing if no other explanation is available.
- Parents are encouraged to ask their children or monitor for any cough, congestion, shortness of breath, or gastrointestinal symptoms every morning. Any positives should prompt the parent to keep the student home from school and seek out testing.
